Nasty bugs

There have been a couple of nasty bugs going around that have knocked many of our students for 6 over the past 4-5 weeks. We were hopeful that the bugs would have taken a break over the holidays, but no- they have come back with a vengeance! This week we have had approximately 50 students away each day with cold and flu like symptoms. A high fever seems to be one of the commonalities to the illnesses.

In response we have increased the level of cleaning that our cleaning contractors undertake every day and have ensured that all working surfaces and touch points are wiped down with an anti-viral product every afternoon.

Unfortunately, the illness that is going around has coincided with the biennial swimming programme which has resulted in some students missing some of the sessions.



School Swimming

The feedback I have had about the swimming sessions from the instructors and the teachers has been great. Having the sessions run consecutively over 10 school days has meant that students have been able to build on the skills they picked up the day before and really make great progress.

Some students who on the first Monday basically sunk when they tried to do backstroke were able to confidently swim a length of backstroke by the end of their sessions.

Students who were scared of water on day 1 where splashing around and putting their heads under after just a few sessions. The seniors loved the water safety aspect of their sessions with the boats and kayaks being a real highlight. Next week we will be sending home a progress report card from the swimming instructors for all the students who participated in the swimming programme.

Thank you to those of you who have given feedback about the timing and organisation of the swimming programme. We will be sending out a brief survey over the next couple of weeks to gather some feedback so we can continually improve the programmes that we offer.

We have just completed the biennial pool based swimming programme for the whole school. Unfortunately, coinciding with this, we have also have experienced widespread illness during this period.

When booking the swimming lessons, we endeavour to keep the cost per child as low as we possibly can to cover the costs of the buses, swimming instructors and also pool entry fee. Most of these costs are fixed (apart from the pool entry fee, which is minimal) and will still need to be paid irrelevant of the actual numbers swimming. While \$7.50 per session for a swimming lesson taught by a qualified instructor, including transport to and from the pool is good value for money we do appreciate that when this is multiplied by 10, or more if you have more than one child involved, the costs can add to the financial pressure that families face.

The BoT have acknowledged that there are some families who will be invoiced or who have paid for swimming, yet their children missed a majority of the lessons due to illness.

If your child missed a majority of the swimming sessions due to illness and you would like to discuss a refund for the sessions missed or a reduction in the amount you will be invoiced, please contact Manuela or Bradley and we will see what we can do.


HIGH FIVE



The triple chocolate-flavoured ice-cream, in a cone, melted rapidly from the scorching blaze of the camp fire. - Felix


My ice-cream, chocolate as always, melted down my arm. - Jimmy

Greedy cat


Room 7 and 8 have been reading books by Joy Cowley. We painted Greedy cat and wrote stories about him being sneaky, cheeky and greedy.....








