Beeswax wraps

Isn't glad rap just so convenient? Not really, half the time people just though it away instead of recycling it. So how are we going to stop that? Nature provided the answer. Bee's wax can be used for many things and is great because it is mostly water prove and easy to mould to food. Here is a step by step report on how to make a beeswax wrap: You will need:

Beeswax (Harris Road honey (Material (big enough for your food) Saucepan
Brush
2 pieces of baking paper
Steam iron

NOTE: can be messy, use an old pan and clean surface

Put your saucepan on the stovetop and set to low heat and put your block of wax in wait until it has entirely melted

Layout your material on a clean but unwanted surface e.g newspaper <u>non-fancy</u> side up then brush the wax over it Wait until dry and lay one piece of baking paper on the surface and then place the soon to be wax wrap over the parchment then add the second piece so it looks like a sandwich.

Use your steam iron and iron over the sandwich shape

Let dry and eat your sandwich with STYLE!





SCIENCE PROJECT

Kia Ora from Mrs Gibson


Since February I have been a participant on the Science Teaching Leadership Programme, funded by the New Zealand Government and managed by the Royal Society Te Apārangi. During the week I have been hosted at Victoria University in the School of Biological Sciences. I have been working with a team of scientists who are researching urban and marine biodiversity.

One weekend in February I collected data on the abundance of mobile and sessile marine species. I was amazed to identify and count different seaweeds, snails and barnacles on the South Coast. At Titahi Bay we investigated the movement of limpets. Finally, at Pauatahanui Inlet we collected data about cockles.

During March I spent a week on Matiu/Somes Island completing mark-recapture study building an inventory of the population of tuatara on the island. It was a fun experience, clambering over logs and tracking through bush late at night. My colleagues were very happy about our individual captures.
